
Help Elsie find her way through the Nebraskan prairie grass and back to Timmy Tune.

But when her mother dies and her father moves them to the faraway prairies of Nebraska, Elsie hears only the silence, and she feels alone in the wide sea of grass. Her only comfort is her canary, Timmy Tune. His songs fill her quiet days. But when Timmy flies out the window, Elsie is forced to run after him into the tall grass where she's finally able to hear the voice of the prairie—the sweet sounds of birds and wind and grass—and she begins to feel at home.






/ earn more about the Author and Illustrator

But the idea for the story came from her husband, David Stemple, who, over his lifetime, traveled to many faraway places in the world, listening to and understanding birds. Born and raised in New York City, Jane Yolen now lives in Hatfield, Massachusetts and St. Andrews, Scotland.

He has illustrated over forty picture books, including the Caldecott Medal-winning So You Want To Be President? and the Caldecott Honor-and Christopher Medal-winning The Gardener, which was written by his wife, Sarah Stewart.






Story Time Read Aloud Discussion Questions

- Boston is described as a busy place with lots of noise. What kinds of sounds does Elsie hear in her Boston home? Are they anything like the sounds you hear where you live?
- With so many differences between Boston and the Nebraskan prairie, it's no wonder Elsie felt out of place. Compare and contrast the city and the country. Where would you rather live?
- With Timmy Tune's help, Elsie is able to appreciate her new home. What lesson do you think Elsie learns at the end?
- When Elsie runs back to her father, she doesn't put Timmy Tune back in his cage. Why do you think it was important for her to let the bird go?
- It's always a difficult thing to release the things we care about most. What would you have done in Elsie's place? Would you have kept Timmy? Why or why not?
