A here are over 37 million Hispanics in the United States according to the most recent census records. That makes Hispanics the largest minority group in the nation! In addition, Hispanics are the largest group of English Language Learners in U.S. schools. There is a great need for children's and young adult Hispanic American literature that reflects the experiences and cultures of this large segment of the American ethnic mosaic. Hispanic American children need to see themselves reflected in their nation's design and mainstream children can learn about and become more aware of other people, their cultures, their values, and their languages through high-quality multicultural books. Hispanic American literature can easily be integrated into all levels of school curricula, enriching a uniquely American mosaic. Books can open doors to cross-cultural understanding in our increasingly diverse society.

Selecting Books for the Classroom

E ducators have a daunting responsibility for selecting high-quality literature that authentically represents many distinct cultural backgrounds. Here are some helpful suggestions for selecting Hispanic and Hispanic American books for classroom use:

1. Recognize the nature of the labels "Hispanic" and "Hispanic American" which are umbrella terms that encompass many distinct cultural backgrounds from Central and South America, Spain, and the Caribbean.

2. Distinguish between Hispanic and Hispanic American literature. Books set in Hispanic countries are valuable for classroom use but should not supplant those that represent the bicultural experiences of Hispanic Americans living in the U.S. Many children of Hispanic decent in America's classrooms may connect more readily to books set in the U.S. that reflect the mix of cultures woven into their everyday lives.

3. Look for well-written and beautifully illustrated books that present positive and authentic images of Hispanics and Hispanic Americans. Good culturally conscious books can communicate to children what it means to be proud of their heritages and experiences as Hispanic Americans. Try to include books that go beyond the surface aspects of a culture like specific holidays and foods to those that reflect deeper cultural values such as the concern and respect shown between generations in families. For example, *Too Many Tamales!* by Gary Soto and *Erandi's Braids* by Antonio Madrigal both present young children with warm images of love and caring between generations in Mexican and Mexican American families.

4. Consult award lists specifically honoring varied genres of Hispanic and Hispanic American books. The biennial Pura Belpré Award for Latino Children's Literature¹ selects excellent examples of high quality multicultural literature that can be enjoyed by all children such as Gary Soto's books, *Chato's Kitchen* and *Chato and the Party Animals*. The annual Américas Award for Children's and Young Adult Literature² also specializes in honoring books reflecting Hispanic and Caribbean cultures such as the excellent photoessay *Fiesta U.S.A.* by George Ancona.

Language Choices

here are several language formats to consider when selecting Hispanic books. Some books are available in separate Spanish editions and English editions. Spanish editions written entirely in the Spanish language are essential for students in programs aiming to maintain literacy in the native tongue. In addition to original Spanish works, some classic children's literature like *The Very Hungry Caterpillar (La Oruga Muy Hambrienta)* and *The Snowy Day (Un Día de Nieve)* are now available translated into Spanish editions.

Other books use an interlingual format in which the text is written predominantly in English but is sprinkled with Spanish words that flow naturally in the text. Don't let Spanish words intimidate you! They are easily pronounced and understood through context cues and glossaries provided by the authors as in Gary Soto's *If the Shoe Fits*, and in Arthur Dorros' *Abuela*.

Still other books contain complete English and Spanish language texts in one single edition such as Tony Johnston's *My Mexico*—*México Mío*. These books can be enjoyed by Spanish speakers learning English, English speakers learning Spanish, and all students gaining multicultural insights and experiences with a taste of a new language.

Experiencing Literature

Books should be at the core of literacy development for all children. Students may be encouraged to respond to literature in a variety of ways (oral, written, artistic, dramatic responses) and to personally connect to books. Here are some activities using literature that can make learning engaging for all students:

Booktalks

Children may need to be encouraged to try varied genres of books or to choose books in general, especially if read-alouds and library visits are not in their background experiences. Teachers and librarians can prepare short, motivating oral presentations about a book to stimulate children's interest in reading it. Students can also learn to give booktalks to entice peers to read favorite books in the upbeat style popularized on "Reading Rainbow," the public television program.

Sketch to Stretch

As a reading strategy especially good for English Language Learners, students may draw and share images they visualized while reading. They may also sketch a personal response to a book, using art as a medium of self-expression.

Radio-Read

Students take turns reading aloud with a partner. It may help to pair one reader who needs support with a more proficient reader. Each reader decides when to stop (always at the end of a sentence) so the partner must follow along closely for his/her 'turn' (also called Pair Read and Partner Read). Partners can support each other while enjoying the independence of turn-taking decision-making.

Poetry Jams

Oral recitation of poetry is common in many Hispanic cultures. Teams of middle grade students can prepare an oral presentation of favorite short poems such as those written by Gary Soto in *Fearless Fernie*. Younger students may get started in this activity using one of the play rhymes in *Diez Deditos* by José-Luis Orozco.

Characters in Clay

Most children love to create with clay yet it is infrequently used in classrooms. With inexpensive Play-doh³ clay students can create "characters in clay" to be used in dioramas or dramatic presentations based on books. They can also fashion other simple props to depict settings in books.

Book Posters

Students can create posters advertising favorite books and display them in the classroom and school libraries. Afford bilingual children the opportunity to create posters in their native languages.

Character WebPages

Help middle grade students to create a webpage for a book character. This activity requires a deep understanding of the character in order to create an interesting and representative webpage in English or Spanish or a bilingual version.

Content Area Links to Literature

iterature can be used as teaching material in the content areas of social studies, science, health, art, and math in addition to its more typical use in reading and the language arts. Books can bring content areas to life through well-illustrated and composed information books, and memorable characters and settings in picture books and novels.

Social Studies

American readers are beginning to appreciate the contributions of diverse peoples to their nation and others through books that address omissions and distortions in history. For example, *The Incas** by Tim Wood, enriches knowledge of this important indigenous group often omitted in North American classrooms. Varied settings such as Guatemala in the touching story of *My Pig Amarillo* by Satomi Ichikawa, can be linked to map work and geography skills.

Science

Books such *Te Amo, Sol/ Te Amo, Luna; I Love You Sun/I Love You Moon* by Karen Pandell can introduce basic physical science concepts (sun, moon, water, stars) for both English and Spanish readers in a natural and motivating way. Tales such as Jan Brett's *The Umbrella* give insights into the flora and fauna of diverse regions like Central America with text and illustrations that are well integrated.

Health

The seven National Health Education standards blend well with critical literacy principles and reader-response techniques. Improved communication across generations, genders and races; facing emotional and educational challenges; staying healthy despite peer pressures are central topics recommended for authentic discussions in the field of health education. Books like *Crazy Loco* by David Rice and *An Island Like You You: Stories of the Barrio* by Judith Ortiz-Cofer offer entries to such discussions which can lead to health-enhancing behaviors. *Go and Come Back* by Joan Abelove could also be used to compare nutritional traditions between the two distinct areas compared in the novel—New York and the Peruvian jungle.

Art

Besides examining the varied artistic styles and media used in picture books, students can study specific artists using books such as *Frida Kahlo: The Artist Who Painted Herself* by Margaret Frith, which provides an interesting female figure in the international world of art. *Celia Cruz, Queen of Salsa* poignantly captures the life and earnest beginnings of one of the world's most renowned singers, with its colorful and lyrical text. Both of these titles suggest a model for meaningful reports on biographies for children. *Niño's Mask* by Jeanette Winter introduces the craft of mask carving within an interesting story.

Math

Marcos Counts by Tomie dePaola introduces children to the numbers 1 through 10, *Arrow to the Sun* by Gerald McDermott uses basic geometric shapes to illustrate a folk tale—books such as these can serve as motivating introductions to math concepts for English and Spanish speaking children.

Sampling Genres

he use of different genres in the classroom not only exposes students to a wide variety of literature but also provides frameworks for story types useful in reading comprehension and writing. Books that celebrate Hispanic heritage can also be used to encourage genre awareness.

Traditional Literature

Folktales, legends, fables, and myths have entertained and instructed children and adults for thousands of years. These beloved stories, which grew from the imaginations of ordinary people, can give readers insights into cultural values and universal concerns. *The Legend of the Poinsettia* by Tomie dePaola shares a young Mexican girl's wisdom regarding gifts from the heart. *The Tale of Rabbit and Coyote*, also set in Mexico, by Tony Johnston presents a humorous character in the trickster tradition. This genre, which grew from oral story-telling, is especially effective for read-alouds.

Picture Books

A product of the 20th century, picture books use both words and illustrations to tell a story. Originally geared for primary school aged children, the current trend is to use picture books with older readers to enrich thematic unit study, provide information, as well as to exemplify the literary elements. *Miss Rumphius (La Señorita Runfio)* by Barbara Cooney will delight young children with its simple message in words and pictures to make the world more beautiful and can also launch older readers into environmental and botanical studies. *Mama and Papa Have a Store* by Amelia Lau Carling presents a truly cross-cultural story giving information on the little known migration of Chinese families to Guatemala shortly before World War II.

Modern Fantasy

Children love the highly imaginative yet believable stories of modern fantasy. Special favorites are animal fantasies such as *The Original Adventures of Hank the Cowdog (Las Verdaderas Aventuras de Hank, El Perro Vaquero)* in which animals humorously behave as human beings. Also beloved are personified toy stories like *Winnie-the-Pooh* now translated into Spanish in *Winny de Puh*. Students may write their own animal or toy fantasies or enact favorite episodes through Readers Theater.

Realistic Fiction

Children often recognize their own experiences or those of family and friends in stories with realistic characters, plots, and settings. *An Island Like You* by Judith Ortiz-Cofer and *Felita* by Nicholasa Mohr offer readers beautifully portrayed slices of life in diverse house-holds and neighborhoods and give a realistic view of an important aspect of American society. Students can share responses to these books in Literature Circles and connect them to their own unique experiences.

Multicultural Possibilities

Reading books to children and encouraging children to read independently are two activities that earn universal favorable recognition in the world of literacy development. Experts may debate about reading methodologies, but they don't question the value of reading and being read to. Children deserve the pleasure of hearing and seeing beloved stories in their native language by the best authors and illustrators the world has to offer. A commitment to using bilingual and multicultural books makes that possible. The American mosaic can be appreciated by all readers as cultures and languages cross and mingle in books that make multiculturalism more than a fashionable phrase in educational circles.
