Getting Organized: Which Way to Go

In considering which of the four options you would like to pursue at this time, the questions that follow may be of assistance to you. Examine the four sets of statements below. If the statement fits you, check "Yes." If it does not, answer "No." Answer as honestly and objectively as possible. See scoring instructions on page 357.

Scenario I—Entrepreneurs

- 1. Having the freedom to create **Y/N** my own work is extremely important to me.
- 2. When I have an idea that I'm excited about, I get everybody around me excited about it too.
- 3. I enjoy aggressively going after what I want.
- 4. When I take on a project, I'm practically married to it until it's done.
- 5. I trust my instincts, and I am able to act decisively.
- 6. I thrive on challenge.
- 7. It's okay with me if people think I'm a little crazy, as long as I believe in what I'm doing. ____
- 8. I'd say that a natural ability to lead is one of my strongest talents.

9. I am prepared to work more than forty hours a week.

10. I never let it stop me if I don't know how to do something.I just jump in the middle of it, and pretty soon, I've got it figured out.

Scenario II—Freelancers

I have little patience for bureaucracy and red tape. 7. I make most of my business decisions intuitively, independent of the feedback of others. 8. I don't want to be tied down to any one location. 9. I'd say that I possess a good deal of self-discipline. 10. I don't want the responsibility or the hassle of managing an organization.

Scenario III—Nonprofit Founders

- 3. Economic profit is not as important to me as working at something I believe in.

Scenario IV—Job Seekers

I want to create a steady, reliable income to support myself while I am training for my chosen field. 10. I like to leave work at work. I try to keep my work life and my personal life separate.

Now check over your answers, and tally up the number of "Yes" responses in each scenario. If most of your "Yes" answers were in the first scenario, you may prefer to create your own business now or later. If you had more "Yes" responses in the second scenario, you may want to try working as a freelance. If most of your "Yes" answers were in the third scenario, you may want to begin your own nonprofit organization. If you had more "Yes" answers in the fourth scenario, you will probably want to work for an organization that fits your goals.
